COLLINGBOURNE DUCIS PARISH COUNCIL

Peter Knowlson (01264 850812), Chairman, writes:

Spring Clean / Litter Pick – I would like to start off by saying how great it was to see over thirty people turn up for this year's spring litter pick. I know some people feel it is not their job to pick up litter and they're right, it is not. However, litter is unfortunately a fact of life. We are fortunate to live in an area which suffers far less than others. Having these events helps keep the Village clean and gives people a sense of pride in where they live. So a big THANK YOU to all those who turned out and made it another successful event. The Parish Council has also managed to source some extra free litter picking equipment via Wiltshire County Council to help us in the future.

A338 Speeding Traffic – Following the metro count that was in place in the Village along the A338 Road (north on Sunton Road) during the period 11/02/2019 and 17/02/2019, the results have come back as follows:

Speeds for a total of 24,795 vehicles in free-flowing traffic in both directions were recorded.

Total traffic volume during this period was 56,451 vehicles. (This figure may be higher than above due to congestion when 'free-flowing' speeds cannot be recorded.)

The 85th percentile speed (the speed at or below which 85% of all traffic is observed to travel under free-flowing conditions past a monitored point) was 39.6 mph. The average speed was 33.8 mph.

Action can be considered in a 30 mph zone when the 85th percentile speed exceeds 35.1 mph. As the relevant recorded speed recorded was 39.6 mph, the village qualifies for the option to have a

community speed watch. Police enforcement only comes into effect if the 85th percentile speed exceeded 42 mph. The Parish Council will be looking into the possibility of a community speed watch. If you would be interested in volunteering please let myself or the parish clerk know, and we will provide further details in due course once the Parish Council has obtained the full details.

This would seem to be a reasonable request to make of anyone who is planning a festivity in our Parish.

Hibiscus writes:

The 28th March saw the arrival of Ray Broughton formerly from Sparsholt College to give us one of his highly entertaining and informative talks. His main subject was Containers, Hanging Baskets, and their



Maintenance. He also talked about recycling and its commercial use for pots and compost. This was an enormous range to cover.

Ray advised that although ceramic glazed pots are very attractive, they do not hold and absorb water like plain clay pots. Another hint (he was keeping us on our toes) was for unglazed pots in the winter. Apparently if we paint the rim with vinegar this will prevent the pot from cracking in frost.

Back to recycling, and plant pots are now being made from reconstituted cardboard boxes and the plants can be planted straight into the ground in the pots.

The topic of raised beds was considered and we were advised that the base of the beds should be of drainage material and then add the topsoil.

So many topics were covered that we could have stayed for hours listening to his fascinating presentation. We will definitely be asking him back again. Bring your notebooks.

Patti Marsh writes:

Following on from last month's instalment of my uncle's war-time memories, here is the next piece he wrote. He didn't write about the time between him joining up in September 1939 and January 1943 as he said it was mostly boring and uneventful.

Algiers

On 17th January 1943 our regiment embarked from Greenock on the ship *Reina del Pacifico* and after eleven days at sea we arrived in Algiers where the entrance to the harbour was littered with small sunken craft, but eventually we got into the port.



Carrying our ammunition and weapons we marched through the town of Algiers where we were watched by the local inhabitants, who looked seriously suspicious - as I am sure we did to them! We marched for approximately four miles to Fort di Lew, which was a campsite on sand under some large fir trees. Once we had been allocated our tents we stripped off and made for a dip in the Blue Med. On board ship we could only remove our boots so the swim was most welcome and, as the army didn't issue swimming trunks, we all went in wearing nothing but our birthday suits! It was about 200 yards back to the tents but it was so warm we didn't need a towel.

While we were at Fort di Lew we had some training from the Navy who came with assault boats which could accommodate a platoon of approximately thirty six men. After taking us down the coast we made a practice landing and then had to march back to camp, we then had to repeat this exercise for three days running. This training was to come in very handy later on when we invaded Italy.

Tunisia - April 1943

The war continued with training, occasional skirmishes, and a certain amount of boredom and in April 1943 I was now a corporal and we were transported to Tunisia.

I remember one particular heavy attack in which we had lost several of our officers and men. My section was leading over open ground and we came under fire from a hilltop to our right. The enemy was firing tracer so we could see from where he was firing. My L.M.G. (light machine gunner) engaged him but this did not seem to have any effect.

While the enemy machine gunner was firing, I noticed a stationery tank whose track had been damaged by a mine and was unable to move. I moved over to the tank, picked up a lump of rock and banged on the side of it until the tank commander eventually poked his head out of the turret and pointed to the rear of the tank. When I walked around the back, I noticed an armoured box with a handle on the bottom. I pulled this and out dropped a telephone! I was then able to explain that all our officers had been killed and this machine gunner was doing a lot of damage to the rest of the company.

Though they could not move the tank itself, they could turn its turret, and the second shot from its big gun was a direct hit, which sent huge lumps of concrete slabs flying. We then realised just how well he had been protected and why my L.M.G. had been unable to touch him.

One of my lads had been hit and as I crawled forward to help him, I received a burst of fire. One bullet removed my helmet, one went through the small pack on my back, and another threw up a splinter

of rock, which stuck in my upper lip giving me a mouth full of blood. Yet another bullet hit me under my arm and departed through the fleshy part of my back.

After receiving treatment from a stretcher-bearer, I was ordered back to the A.D.S. (Advance Dressing Station) and spent the next three weeks in an army hospital tent being looked after by the Queen Alexandra Nurses. The hospital was out in the desert and during the day the nurses would roll up the flaps of the tent to give us patients in bed a bit more air. Unfortunately, there were times when the breeze got up and it felt like more like someone had opened up an oven door!

SAVERNAKE TEAM LETTER

I apologise in advance of writing this letter. In six years it is the first time I have written thus.



Parochial Church Councils across the team have asked me to share our financial crisis with the wider public. Most of the churches are functioning at a substantial annual loss.

This letter comes out only a week after Easter in the period when we celebrate the birth of 'the Church.' Theologically, 'the Church' is the community of believers.

It has also come to mean the place where those believers meet to worship. It is this second meaning that is the most challenging for the Savernake Team. Our communities of believers are relatively small and currently subsidise the use of the buildings both in time and money.

The community of believers will continue, of that I have absolutely no doubt. We can worship anywhere. I have celebrated across the world in schools, houses, under trees and on top of hills. A roof is nice as it keeps the sun and the rain off.

We love our historic buildings and have a responsibility to them. They represent continued worship over hundreds and thousands of years. Our duty of care simply requires making sure they are watertight and thus that the fabric is sound.

One of the costs is our contribution to the national church, called 'the share.' It is a nationwide calculation aimed at providing the coverage required of a national church. It is for you to have access to baptisms, marriages and funerals, or a vicar if you need one. This team, twelve church buildings and 100 square miles, is subsidised by the Diocese and the hours parishioners and clergy give for no cost. Some of us are given a modest living to allow us to do this work. The "this pays vicars' wages!" viewpoint is incorrect and hurtful to those who give of their own time.

Recently, one building in the team needed £55,000 for repairs only to lose the roof to thieves. The total bill of twice that was met in that very small community where Sunday attendance is only a handful. In Great Bedwyn, repair of our miraculous bell, that fell not killing anyone, may have to wait until we have repaired our leaking roof.

It is easy to help!

If you believe you are a believer, come to church. If the services don't suit you, talk to us. Your presence alone will help to justify our labours and our expense.
