Chairman Paul Hartley writes:

Winter has given way to Spring and Covid restrictions have finally eased. What should be a natural moment for real optimism and joy is sadly being tainted by the horrific conflict in Ukraine; the impact on the people directly affected by it and the ripple effects it will have in our own community. We have all seen and felt living costs and in particular, significant fuel and utility price increases in recent weeks. In response to this your Parish Council has pressed our Wiltshire Council Representative, Councillor Chris Williams, to encourage Wiltshire Council to do more to support its communities at this difficult time. Whilst we await a response and indeed action from Wiltshire Council, I have included at the end of this update a number of sources of information, support and advice that are available to help individuals and families in what I fear is an emerging cost of living crisis.

Looking specifically at your Parish Council news, change continues to be the theme. At the time of writing, a new bus shelter for the Everleigh Road junction has been purchased and is due to be installed in early April. Additionally, a Speed Indicator Device (SID) has been purchased and will shortly be in use. As we commence operating the SID, you may notice that we are initially leaving the display turned off to enable it to silently collect data on traffic speeds at different points in the village – it is not broken! From a road safety perspective this is an important part of our initial roll-out to enable us to identify where the road safety areas and times of concern are and then enable us to measure the effectiveness of the SID once the display is turned on. The data collected will assist the targeted use of the Speed Watch Team as well as requests for Police enforcement support where appropriate.

Another important upcoming change is a significant revamp and modernisation of the Village Website. You will see this change in the coming months and as part of the development we are asking all parishioners for your views. We want the new-look website to be as usable, interactive, local group and business friendly as possible – I encourage you to all to respond to the short survey so that your thoughts and needs are captured in its design. This can be done online at https://tinyurl.com/yck7pb7j or through the flyer that has been included in this Courier edition for Collingbourne Ducis residents.

Planning for the Collingbourne Ducis Jubilee Event on Thursday 2nd June continues. There will be a full update and wider advertisement in the May 2022 edition of the Courier, however some preliminary details to whet your appetite are: that it will be an afternoon/evening event commencing with a Garden Party at the Village Hall and Recreation Ground, complete with complimentary refreshments, children's entertainment, bar (with drinks to purchase), live music and with the support of the Tipple Inn, the lighting of a village beacon at 9.45 pm. Importantly, with occasions to celebrate together with friends, family and communities over the last few years having been so difficult, we are happy to announce that this event will be open to all residents of Collingbourne Ducis, Collingbourne Kingston and Everleigh.

In preparation for the Platinum Jubilee celebrations, your Parish Council will be leading on two events:

Sunday 10th April – Village Spring Clean: a village spring clean as part of the Great British Spring Clean 2022. Meeting at 10 am at the Village Hall, all are welcome to help get the Village looking fabulous as we come out of winter. Equipment and free refreshments will be provided.

Sunday 28th May – Jubilee Bunting Hanging: all are encouraged to hang their bunting in preparation for the upcoming Platinum Jubilee celebrations. In addition to the bunting you hang, the Parish Council will decorate the key communal areas of the village. This will no doubt be an impressive display throughout our village in support of our parish, street and family celebrations.

The Parish Council still has a couple of vacancies, the Speed Watch will never say no to additional members and the Parish Jubilee event requires support to deliver. THE VIEW FROM EVERLEIGH

Denis Bottomley, Chairman, (01264 852731) writes: We are making progress on our Everleigh Enhancement plans: a new all-weather bench will be positioned in the vicinity of



the village playground with views of Sidbury Hill and Baden's Clump; two 'Caution Horses' warning signs are due to be installed on the Netheravon Road in the spring; and our first flower planter has been sited at the playground. We plan to deploy several flower planters throughout the village, adopted by adjacent residents who bid for and maintain a planter. The Parish Council would supply the planter, soil and plants; adopters would then water, feed and weed them. Any resident wishing to adopt a flower planter would be most welcome. In addition we are developing a village street map, primarily to assist delivery drivers. A draft prototype will be displayed in the Bus Shelter until 15th June for villagers to view and make comment. Our village Litter Pick took place on Saturday 12th March. Many thanks go to the nineteen volunteers who took part and collected eighteen bags of rubbish. Everleigh is certainly looking much cleaner as a result.

Our next gathering will be a village work party on Saturday 9th April from 9.30 am until lunchtime to conduct general maintenance and tidying up at the Playground. Please bring paint brushes and strimmers if you have them. We are very proud of our Playground which remains a key village asset, developed over many years, so let's look after it.

Planning is underway for the village to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee on Thursday 2nd June at the start of a national four

day weekend. The event will take place at the playground/Jubilee field and comprise of a BBQ and games/activities such as egg and spoon races, relay races, rounders, volleyball, golf pitch and putt and coconut shy, starting at 5 pm. Festivities will culminate with the lighting of a bonfire beacon at 9.45 pm to synchronise with beacons across the nation. Please mark up your diaries!

The Defence Infrastructure Organisation (DIO) are continuing with its work to remove trees infected with Ash Dieback disease. The next phase will involve a number of temporary road closures on the A342 and Marlborough Road. Work started on 14th March and will continue until mid-April. Road closures will take place between 7 am and 6 pm on weekdays only.

Communication and transparency are two key principles guiding our Parish Council operations. We promulgate information on village events, meetings, planning, property, infrastructure, Wiltshire Council notices and financial matters. 

New long-distance walking, cycling and riding route – Pewsey Vale Circular Way

The Pewsey Vale Tourism Partnership has launched a new long-distance walking, cycling and riding route, the Pewsey Vale Circular Way. The way marked route is a seventy seven mile walking route or a seventy two mile cycling/riding route, with the Vale of Pewsey at its heart (passing through Collingbourne Ducis and Everleigh).

Dramatic downland, secluded woodland, sweeping valleys and the Kennet and Avon Canal provide a rich variety of landscapes for the walker, rider or cyclist to enjoy.

The walking route has been divided into seven stages, with ideas on where to eat, where to stay and transfer options available. All the information, including maps, gpx downloads and other useful information can be found at www.visitpewseyvale.co.uk/discover-pewsey-vale

Dawn Wilson, Chair of the Partnership, said, 'The Pewsey Vale Circular Way is the third itinerary we have published for use by visitors and by local people, but it is the first one that is a completely new route. The Pewsey Vale Circular Way is truly spectacular and is the culmination of an extensive community project funded by the Pewsey Area Board, the Co-op Community Fund and Tesco

Groundwork. We have to give a huge thank you to Ron Forbes, Gerard Dinnage and Trevor Neal for devising the routes and for the way marking of them – an enormous task. Thanks also to our small army of local people who have been checking the route for us and to those who helped us with images as well as Jonathan Martin for his cycling videos – all these voluntary contributions are so important to a community project like this. This new route supports our recent accreditation with Walkers are Welcome, demonstrating the quality and variety of walking in the area and will encourage people to visit the area and to stay longer.'

HOME-START SEEKS VOLUNTEERS TO SUPPORT MILITARY FAMILIES

The Russian invasion of Ukraine has resulted in an increase in British troops deployed to Estonia. Many military personnel who were due to return on completion of military exercises in the region are now having to remain. The Defence Secretary, Ben Wallace, told the House of Commons that the people of Wiltshire and the families of the deployed troops 'Should be enormously proud' but he warned that they would not know when their loved ones would be coming home again.

Home-Start Kennet have been supporting military families in Tidworth for over thirty years but in recent weeks they have experienced a sudden increase in the number of enquiries and requests for help. In response to this, the charity is opening a Friendship Café for supported families at Tidworth Leisure Centre. This will run every Friday, from 10 am to 12 noon, from 1st April and will provide a warm, welcoming, relaxed atmosphere for Home-Start families to meet, with Home-Start staff and volunteers on hand to listen, chat and play! Other than support through the café, the charity provides trained volunteers to offer longer term, one to one homevisiting support to young families who are struggling with isolation, anxiety, and loneliness. These are just some of the challenges faced by families new to the military and new to Wiltshire. Want to get involved? There are still places available to train to become a Home-Start volunteer. RECIPE: CREAMY CHICKEN PIE (WITH CRISPY POTATO TOPPING)

It's safe to say this one is a real favourite at our house and apparently it was originally created to celebrate Prince Harry's birthday (don't hold that against me or the recipe though). Instead of opting for a traditional pastry crust it is topped with a delicious layer of thinly sliced potatoes covered with golden cheesy breadcrumbs. It only takes around forty-five minutes to make and freezes very well. Give it a try and you can thank me later!

Ingredients (for four people)

- 4 potatoes
- 2 leeks
- 2 celery sticks (I leave this out as it is the food of the devil)
- 250g punnet of mushrooms (ideally chestnut variety)
- 400g (5 or 6) boneless chicken thighs (or 2 chicken breasts)
- 1 chicken stock pot
- 300ml double cream
- 60g mature cheddar cheese
- 50g breadcrumbs (panko work best)
- 200ml water
- 4 tbsp vegetable oil

Method

Put a saucepan of water with a pinch of salt on to boil for the potatoes and preheat your oven to 220°C. Peel the potatoes and slice into 1cm wide rounds. Pop the potatoes into your pan of boiling water, cook until just soft, 10-15 mins. TIP: The potatoes are cooked when you can easily slip a knife through but be careful because you don't want the slices to break up too much. Once cooked, carefully drain in a colander, and set aside.

Meanwhile, remove the root and dark green tops from the leeks, halve lengthways and slice into thin half-moons. Chop the celery into ½cm wide pieces (or leave it out as I do!). Cut the mushrooms into roughly ½cm wide slices. Chop the chicken into bite-sized pieces.

Heat a drizzle of oil in a frying pan on medium-high heat. Add the chicken, season with salt and pepper and cook until the chicken is browned, 5-6 mins. TIP: The chicken is cooked when it is no longer pink in the middle. Cook the chicken in two batches if you need to - in a crowded pan it will stew rather than brown!

Once cooked, remove your chicken from the pan and put on one side. Add a drizzle more oil and the leek and celery. Cook until slightly softened, 4 mins. Add the mushrooms along with a pinch of salt and a good grind of black pepper. Turn the heat up slightly and cook everything together until the mushrooms are slightly browned, about 5 mins.

Pour in the water and add the chicken stock pot. Bring to the boil and stir to dissolve the stock pot. Add the double cream and bring back to the boil, then turn down the heat and simmer gently until reduced by a third, 4 mins. Meanwhile, grate the cheddar cheese into a mixing bowl. Add the breadcrumbs and vegetable oil. Stir together.

Once the sauce has reduced, return the chicken to the frying pan. Taste and add more salt and pepper if you think it needs it. Transfer the chicken mixture to an ovenproof dish and top with the potato slices. Sprinkle over your cheesy breadcrumbs. Season with black pepper and bake on the top shelf of your oven until the top is golden brown, 10 mins.

If you are freezing then do so before you do the final cooking in the oven, defrost when you are ready to try this and heat in the oven for 10 minutes. Enjoy!

THE POWER OF WOMEN'S CIRCLES

Since the beginning of time women have come together in circles to hear each others' stories, to witness each other in their full authenticity. As society developed and became more linear this ancient tradition was lost. People became too busy, disconnected, separate from each other and it is often women who hold the memory of this ancient wisdom in their DNA, that feel this disconnect the most.

Despite strong friendships, there is often little space in women's lives for community and as beings who are hardwired for connection, the structure of women's circles is often a lifeline for women who are looking to improve their mental health and well-being.

Weighed down by the modern dream of trying to have it all, women are often expected to nurture like they don't work and work like they don't have children. Often bearing the role of caregiver, whether that be for their own children, grandchildren or elderly parents; many women do this work unseen and unsupported, not held in the way they hold others as they give until the point of breaking.

Coupled with this often comes guilt, the feeling that we could, should have it all and ever chasing the notion of being enough. All of this leaves women with little space for themselves and statistics show women are feeling more and more separated, both from themselves and from others.

In times gone by sisters would gather in the red tent at the cycles of the moon. Sharing stories, holding space, laughing, crying, witnessing the feminine in all her being. Celebrating the phases of womanhood as we moved through the youth of the maiden, the creative force of the mother and the wisdom of the crone. These spaces were seen as sacred, vital to our wellbeing allowing us the time to reflect, release and renew.

For so long that wisdom has been lost to us yet the benefits of women's circles are well documented; there is a healing that comes from sharing, from allowing ourselves a voice. In addition through connecting with each other and women from all different walks of life, we realise just how similar our struggles are to those of the other women gathered and when we start speaking, we begin to see that we all experience comparable feelings and emotions each month, or across each moon cycle.

Going to a women's circle doesn't have to be 'woo', spiritual or any of the other labels we like to put on them. Yes, these gatherings are intimate, yes, there is an atmosphere of the sacred created by relaxing music, candles, flowers, and an invitation to listen from the heart but, ultimately women's circles are a space for all women, regardless of their backgrounds or beliefs to come and be seen and heard. A place to lay down all you are carrying in a safe and supportive environment where there is no judgement.

In this Church period of Lent, we gaze towards the disturbing sight of the crucifixion of Jesus. The disturbance of our world in which the sins and failures of history have not succeeded in changing humanity's arrogance.

For two years our lives have been disturbed by Covid and storms. We are now disturbed by war. Evil reveals our own impotence and weakness. It brings a worldwide threat of poverty and hunger. It produces tears of pain and despair.

But the disturbance by evil shrinks when faced by the disturbance of good. Good calls us to account, humbling us with the generosity and goodness of those around us.

It is simple things like the pride of children in making sunflower lapel badges for the Ukraine and its spread to other schools and parliament. Financially challenged churches committing to give from their collections. Artists donating work in an auction. Parish Councillors approaching Wiltshire to use a vacant building to house refugees.
