THE VIEW FROM EVERLEIGH

Denis Bottomley, Chairman, (01264 852731) writes: We have made progress on our Everleigh Enhancement plans: a new all-weather bench has been positioned by the rear



South East side gate of the village playground with views of Sidbury Hill and Baden's Clump; two 'caution, horses' warning signs have been installed on the Netheravon Road (for which we are most grateful to Mr Richard Hannon for his generous financial contribution) and our first flower planters have been sited at the playground, in The Street and in West View. We plan to deploy several flower planters throughout the village, adopted by adjacent residents who volunteer to maintain a planter. The Parish Council would supply the planter, soil and plants; adopters would then water, feed and weed them. Any resident wishing to donate plants or adopt a planter would be most welcome; donations can be left at Laburnum/Ivy Cottage opposite the village noticeboard at The Street/A342 junction.

We are also developing a village street map primarily to assist delivery drivers. A draft prototype will be displayed in the bus shelter until 15th June for villagers to view and make comment. Please respond with any comments to Councillor Terry Martin at temmet2001@doctors.org.uk

A village work party took place on Saturday 9th April to conduct general maintenance and tidying up at the playground. Many thanks go to the seven volunteers who cleaned and painted all the equipment and strimmed the perimeter fence. This play area is now looking very smart!

As warned previously, our village celebration of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee takes place on Thursday 2nd June at the playground/Jubilee field, starting at 5 pm. The event will consist of a BBQ and games/activities such as egg and spoon races, relay races, rounders, volleyball, badminton, golf pitch and putt and coconut shy. Festivities will culminate with the lighting of a bonfire beacon at 9.45 pm to synchronise with beacons across the nation. We will be setting up from 9.30 am on the day; all volunteers are welcome.

The Collingbourne Ducis St Andrew's Church Fête takes place this year on Saturday 3rd September from 12 noon until 4 pm in the Ducis Village Hall and on the recreation ground. Everleigh has been invited to participate in fun games activities with Ducis and Kingston folk at this fête. More details will follow in due course.

This will be a fun family event and a real opportunity for us to get together as a community to celebrate Her Majesty The Queen's seventy years of service, so please do come along and join us.



SYLVIA'S LIGHT FRUIT CAKE RECIPE

Jill Cockerton writes:

This is a cake that was often baked by my mother, Sylvia Simpson. After she died, eight years ago, I thought we had lost the recipe but I found it recently, on a scrap of paper in her handwriting. I have expanded it a little by adding metric equivalents and slightly more details than her 'mix, bake' instructions!

Ingredients

4oz/110g softened butter
4oz/110g caster sugar
2 medium eggs
1/4 pint or 120ml of milk
2oz/55g glacé cherries
8oz/220g self-raising flour
1tsp mixed spice
10oz/285g mixed dried fruit (I use raisins and sultanas)
Demerara sugar for sprinkling

Simply mix all of the ingredients except the Demerara sugar together, pour into an eight-inch round, lined tin, sprinkle with Demerara sugar and bake in a medium oven (I do it at about 170 degrees C in a fan oven) for one hour. Leave in the tin for about twenty minutes to cool then take out carefully and cool completely on a wire rack.

I am also interested in photographic memories of the villages in other formats.


For example: the butcher's shop in Ducis; the train halt at Kingston and the station at Ducis.

THINGS I HAVE FOUND IN THE GARDEN

Bricks - Part 37.

I've found quite a few bricks in the garden and there is so much to write about these fascinating and mysterious objects. But I've had a bit of trouble with parts one to thirty-six. Part one was to be on the origin of the brick, i.e., the original brick, but straight away I slammed into the wall which is the conundrum 'what came first the bricklayer or the brick?'. You are advised not to ponder this question. I did, for too long, and now

'all that my mind sees is a quaking bog in a mist stark snapped trees and a ghastly bricklayer building its nest'

Along with Diana Rigg and a fear of contracting Dutch Elm disease, I can't get hideous visions of the flightless bricklayer out of my head. Bricks part one is shelved until I feel a little stronger.

Part two, 'The brick in fiction' foundered when first grab in the bran barrel I got the character Owen Brick from Paul Auster's 'Man in the Dark'.

Now poor Owen is a victim of metafiction, meaning he knows he is only written and that he is not a real Brick.

Metafiction, a completely original idea all tiresome authors eventually come up with, is not somewhere we want to go. Consider Monika Fludernik in her monograph on Gabriel Jospovici, a convicted metafictionalist, pointing out that 'formally foregrounded experimentation' occurs only rarely in Jospovici's short prose, and that 'most of his short stories employ metafictional techniques in order to adequately portray the fictional world in it's

abysses of disillusionment, uncertainty and pathos'. So, no more Part two.

The Cost of Love

Dear Reader,

I am writing the day after we celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus hoping that my words will challenge rather than threaten.

Although he was a religious leader, the whole of Jesus' life was political. He was born in a conquered country. His parents fled to a foreign land so that he could grow up safely. The middle-class occupation of Joseph meant that they were able to thrive and not be a burden in that country. After working himself as a carpenter, Jesus adopted the life of a mendicant preacher, a holy person who challenged the authorities of his time. Eventually, he became too much of an embarrassment and without the courage to use their own method of executing heretics, the religious leaders took him to the governor to have him killed. Three days after yet another of human history's barbaric executions, rumours of his resurrection from the dead reach secular historians.

All religions by their very nature tend to be prophetic. We applaud Russian Orthodox priests who spoke out against the actions of President Putin while we condemn those who support him. When the Archbishop of Canterbury spoke against the proposal to export refugees the reaction revealed a cultural double standard using emotive and irrelevant argumentation. The reaction was irrelevant because it ignored that most basic ethical tenet, the golden rule: Do onto others as you would have done onto you.

The act of caring for our neighbour is political. It challenges the egoist and the cultural narcissist. It passively judges selfishness. It

calls to account those who place self-interest higher than justice. It calls for that unfashionable virtue self-sacrifice which we are happy to admire in the people of the Ukraine. It is the action of big hearts and bigger minds. It should and does make us uncomfortable.

I finish with the words of a hymn which have been going through my head as I write:

This joyful Eastertide away with sin and sorrow

Surely, we should be seeking the end of sin and sorrow not exporting it.

Easter Blessing at this time of hopeful redemption.

What is the APCM? The APCM is the Annual Parochial Church Meeting.

Actually, it comprises two meetings. Firstly, a very short meeting which elects the Church Wardens for the coming year. All parishioners can vote to elect the Church Wardens. This is followed by the APCM itself which is the business meeting of the church, it's a sort of AGM for St Andrew's. It's a meeting we're legally required to have and this year, must take place before the 31st May.

This meeting is only open to members of the church electoral roll, and those present vote on the appointment of PCC members, Deanery Synod representatives once every three years or when there is a vacancy and to accept the audited accounts of the church. It is also an opportunity to catch up with the events of the last year and to explore the vision for the coming year together.

What is the electoral roll? The electoral roll is the membership list of the church. It is revised every year just prior to the APCM and once every six years the entire membership list is deleted and everyone has to re-apply (this will next happen in 2025). You are only on the electoral roll if you have filled in a form since the last full-revision in 2019. You can be a full and active member of the church without joining the roll. However, only members of the electoral roll are permitted to attend and vote at the APCM. If you attend St Andrew's Church and would like to join the electoral roll, you can do so by filling in the form for Application for Enrolment, available on the table by the door of the church, and returning to Tish Leigh at Coombe House, Cadley Road by 4th May.

What is the PCC? PCC stands for 'Parochial Church Council'. The group that has the responsibility for managing the financial and legal responsibilities of the parish. Also responsible for vision, staff management, building management, resources management and so

on. Members of the PCC are elected for three-year terms at the APCM.
