

COLLINGBOURNE DUCIS PARISH COUNCIL

Chairman John Wood writes:

The Council met on 3rd November and there was much to discuss. A long serving member of the council Lucy Gomes has resigned due to work commitments; she has contributed a great deal to the running of the council, particularly as the Planning Representative and will be sadly missed. Cllr Chris Williams reported on his activities with the Wiltshire Council which includied the reading of the Proclamation of King Charles at County Hall, meetings on climate change and initiatives regarding the cost of living and a register of Warm Spaces. During the adjournment for public comment a representative of the School Governing Body brought a proposal for a Walking Bus initiative which was agreed in principle by the Council. The Council reviewed all the suggestions raised by the recent survey which were presented by Cllr Kelly Earle and have appointed leads to take forward the proposals and present back the cost and timeline for the next meeting in December.

Cllr Lyons provided another upbeat report on the General Maintenance of the village, particularly the efforts of the new Parish Steward who continues to post before and after pictures of the work he has been conducting in the village. Steve has engaged with the Sparkle Team for the Autumn clear up after the successful litter pick in October which was well attended and removed a considerable amount of rubbish. Steve is planning the next litter pick for the Spring. Cllr Tom Earle briefed on the quotations for the new grass cutting contract which was awarded to Idverde for the next three years.

forward to the Glitter Ball and Village Brunch later in the year. These events bring the village together as a true community.

During this year we, alongside the whole country, have had to accept very large increases in our energy bills and general inflation of services and goods. This has meant asking hirers for an interim payment to cover additional costs running into thousands of pounds. Nevertheless, we have managed to maintain our balances whilst improving the building in a number of ways. I consider this to have been as successful a year as possible, taking into account the circumstances we have encountered. I am very grateful to Jane Crook for continuing to run the Draw and to Humphrey Sheppard for taking over the collection and organisation.

Dragonflies have continued to thrive; the Toddlers group has restarted and the school has returned to using the hall on a full-time basis. We have worked with Dragonflies and the School to ensure safe entry and exit. A new door was recently fitted to the small hall, enabling Dragonfly children to enter from that direction. Additional lighting was installed to facilitate this. The disabled toilet has been re-furbished. Through the fund-raising efforts of Film-Place, we now have an advance mode projector and sound system. This alongside improvements to the roof acoustics have completely changed the audio-visual experience in the Hall. The tennis court has been cleaned and re-marked. Work on the footings for the storage extension is to shortly commence.

Looking to the future, we must plan to make the Hall more sustainable. We have a large south facing roof perfect for solar panels and we continue to seek support for funding. Electric powered cars are becoming more commonplace, an EV charging point adjacent to the Hall is being investigated. We have discovered this year that running any public building is expensive. We must continue to explore all possible avenues: Grants, social events, etc. to raise funding and keep providing the excellent all-round community facilities that we offer. Finally, I must offer my sincere thanks to Officers and Committee members for their unstinting support throughout this difficult year.



Ray Broughton, a horticulturist and lecturer from Sparsholt College, made a welcome return in late October with an entertaining and very informative talk on Wall Shrubs and Climbers with lots of anecdotes and information as well.



Apparently, we are no longer allowed to use milk, vinegar or salt in the garden to tackle weeds and pests. He listed several old favourites that have been renamed by the RHS – Rosemary is now a Salvia and Montbretia has been named Crocosmia again. All very confusing but we shall continue to use the names we are familiar with!

Among the numerous tips he gave were to always take cuttings from the centre of plants, avoid the prickles on roses as they can cause tetanus (it's not the thorns), and a reminder of his way of avoiding indoor leggy plants with the manure in an almost air-tight pot.

The November meeting on Thursday 10th November was very well attended. President, Wendy Brown, welcomed members, new



members and visitors. Apologies were given and the minutes of the previous meeting were signed off before she drew attention to forthcoming events. Members were reminded to pay outstanding money for the Christmas Party which is being held on 8th December at The Barleycorn and they were also asked to make their choices from the menu options.

Wendy then introduced Ceri Cryer, the speaker for the evening, who is a cheese maker and had arranged a tempting display of her cheeses on a table. Ceri and her husband make cheese and other dairy products at Brinkworth Dairies on the family farm and the milk she uses comes from their closed herd of Friesian cattle. She began her talk with a brief history of cheese making and moved into how she herself began making it. Her first cheese was Wiltshire loaf, an 'old' county cheese, and her range gradually expanded until she now has several products, including a blue, a soft white cheese, butter and yogurt, which they now sell at London markets, farm shops and on-line.

As Ceri talked about the different cheeses, she passed tasting samples round and at the end of her talk the members gathered round her table to buy. Ceri has a huge enthusiasm for cheese making and is an entertaining speaker who was warmly thanked by Esnay Burns.

The meeting closed with delicious refreshments and the drawing of the raffle.

ANDOVER CHAMBER CHOIR CHRISTMAS CONCERT, 17TH DECEMBER, ST MARY'S ANDOVER

Saturday 17th December sees the return of a long-standing Andover tradition – the Christmas Carol Concert! Andover Chamber Choir (formerly known as The Harmonium Singers) have presented a concert at St Mary's Church each Christmas for over thirty years, until the Covid pandemic intervened. The choir returns, this year, for the first time since 2019. Proceeds have always been donated to a local charity and will be given this time to the Andover Foodbank.

The programme features music both well-known and unfamiliar. Carols such as 'Gaudete!' (made famous by Steeleye Span), 'Gabriel's Message' and Handel's 'Joy to the World' rub shoulders with Holst's 'Jesu, thou virgin born' and 'The Time draws near the Birth of Christ', composed for the 50th anniversary of The Harmonium Singers and here receiving its Covid-delayed premiere. Items will be interspersed with poems and with carols for the audience. Tickets can be bought in advance from The Lights and from the Newbury Building Society or choir members. The admission price (£10 in advance, £12 on the door, under 16s free) includes interval refreshments. The concert takes place exactly a week before Christmas Eve and the day before the World Cup Final so there's no excuse to miss it!

SUNTON FARM

Val Patrick writes:

This historic farm, including the farmhouse, the farm buildings and five cottages, was included in the 1929 Ailesbury Sale as a vacant possession. Having failed to reach its reserve, it was sold soon after by private treaty to Mr Charles Fribbence the landlord of the Kingston Hotel, now the Barleycorn, in Collingbourne Kingston.

One of the most elegant buildings in the area, its story goes back several centuries, but the farmhouse we see today, with its south front of seven bays with a central doorway, was built in the early eighteenth century. It still has a fireplace and chimney from an earlier building on the site, and some seventeenth century panelling in the ground floor room at its west end. Mentioned as early as 1199, it descended through several important families until in 1548 it was sold to Edward Seymour, Duke of Somerset, brother of Jane Seymour.

From 1843 when the farm had 925 acres, it was gradually reduced in size and now all that exist together are the farmhouse and seven acres of land. Between 1843 and 1878, the eastern part became a new farm called Herridge, and by 1910 Sunton Farm had only 334 acres. Finally, in 1973, the remaining land was divided between nearby farms and the farmhouse became a private residence. It was in the parish of Collingbourne Kingston until 1934.

Few people will know of a connection between Sunton House and the slave trade. The owner of the house for more than forty years in the middle of the twentieth century may himself not even have known. He was Major General Hugh Brownlow Hibbert DSO, a pillar of the local community throughout his time there. When David Olasogu in his TV programme 'A House Through Time'

mentioned the Hibberts as being chief among the slave owners of the Caribbean, I decided to investigate. There was no suggestion of ill treatment of the slaves.

Hugh's ancestors who were cotton manufacturers in Manchester had indeed owned vast estates in Jamaica from 1710 onwards, and when the time came to end slavery, they had spoken against abolition. The government of the day paid £103,000 to the family in compensation when slavery finally ended.

Since Major General Hibbert there have been at least six owners of Sunton House which has recently changed hands again. It remains an architectural treasure hidden in the valley below the A338.

CINNAMON AND ORANGE ROLLS

Simon Gilford writes:

My baking journey continues and whilst I'm not a massive cinnamon fan, for some reason I really do love these. I found a simple recipe online, and just because it's the way I roll (get it?), I had to tweak some of the ingredients, and you should certainly do the same. I added in orange rather than sticking to the vanilla from the original recipe and I significantly cut down on the amount of icing sugar in the topping. You could try lemon or maybe even some chocolate.

Ingredients (makes 12 rolls)

The Dough:

600g strong white bread flour (plus extra for dusting)

14g dried active yeast

75g caster sugar

90g unsalted butter

275ml full fat milk

1tsp vanilla extract (if you have some, but not vital)

1 large egg

The Filling:

45g unsalted butter (melted)

175g light brown sugar

1-2tbsps ground cinnamon (depending on your love/hatred of cinnamon)

The Topping:

175g icing sugar

2-3tbsps freshly squeezed orange juice (or try something else!) orange zest

Method

Sift the flour into a large bowl and add the caster sugar and yeast. Mix these together so it's all evenly distributed.

Rub the butter into the mixture so it resembles breadcrumbs, like you would when making scones.

Gently heat the milk until warm - but not piping hot. If heating in a pan, you want it to just about start having steam come out of the pan.

Add the milk, vanilla, and egg to the dry ingredients.

Knead the dough together for 7-10 minutes. It will be sticky at first, but it will soon come together. OR ALTERNATIVELY use a food mixer with the Dough Hook to make this easier.

Once kneaded, it will be springy to the touch and not sticky.

Transfer into a lightly oiled bowl and cover the top of the bowl with cling film. Let it rise in a warm spot for 1-2 hours, or until doubled in size.

Whilst the bread is proving, whisk together the light brown sugar and ground cinnamon for the filling. Leave to the side for now.

Once the dough has risen, transfer it to a lightly floured work surface, and roll it out to a large rectangle. Mine ended up being about 40cm x 30cm.

You want it to be as even a rectangle as possible so it's easier to roll up, and the dough can be thin here.

Gently brush the surface with the 45g of melted butter, and then sprinkle over the sugar/cinnamon mix.

Roll the dough from long side to long side, so that a long sausage is formed. Cut this evenly into 12 pieces.

Using a large, greaseproof-lined rectangular baking dish, mine was 30cm x 24cm roughly, put them in. They won't touch yet, but you want three rows of four. Cover the dish with clingfilm and let them rise for another hour or so. By the end, they should all touch.

Towards the end of the dough rising, preheat the oven to 180C/160C Fan so that when it's finished rising, you can put it straight in the oven.

Bake on the middle shelf of the oven for 20-25 minutes, until golden brown and cooked through.

Leave them to cool (I didn't, and it was a mistake), and then make the icing. Simply whisk together the icing sugar, orange juice and zest until a thick icing paste is formed, and then spread over the cooled rolls.

Enjoy!


