Denis Bottomley, Chairman, (01264 852731) writes: Our village Litter Pick took place on Saturday 11th March. Many thanks go to the seven volunteers who took part and collected



twelve bags of rubbish. Everleigh is certainly looking a lot cleaner as a result.

Our next gathering will be a village work party on Saturday 15th April from 9.30 am until lunchtime to conduct general maintenance and tidying up at the playground; please bring paint brushes and strimmers if you have them. We are very proud of our playground which remains a key village asset developed over many years, so let's look after it.

Planning is underway for the village to celebrate the King's Coronation on Saturday 6th May at the start of a national three-day long weekend. The event will take place at the playground /Jubilee field and includes a BBQ and games/activities such as egg and spoon races, relay races, rounders, volleyball, golf pitch and putt, starting at 5 pm. Festivities will culminate with the lighting of a bonfire beacon at 8.30 pm. Please mark up your diaries!

As reported previously, we donated £200 to Wiltshire Air Ambulance from contributions raised at our Bonfire Night last November. The Parish Council has received a letter from Wiltshire Air Ambulance to thank all those who contributed and to express heartfelt appreciation for this support and generosity.

Have you visited the mobile library in Everleigh recently? It visits The Street in Everleigh (High Trees layby) on a Wednesday every four weeks between 12.25 and 12.55 pm. If you are a parent with young children, you will find a great range of picture books and story CDs for them to enjoy; there are information books and plenty of exciting reading for older children as well. For adults, there is a large range of novels, ranging from the latest thriller to best-selling autobiographies,

cookery and gardening. There is also a wide selection of large print and talking books. It's easy to join, just bring along proof of your name and address and the friendly Mobile Manager will sign you up straight away – they are always happy to help. Finally, the next Parish Council meeting will take place on Tuesday 16th May at 7 pm at the Collingbourne Ducis Village Hall. There will be two sessions - the Annual Parish Meeting and the Annual meeting of the Parish Council. Everyone is welcome to attend.

COLLINGBOURNE DUCIS PARISH COUNCIL

Chairman John Wood writes:

The Collingbourne Ducis Parish Council met for the first time this year on 13th March 2023, with a very full agenda to discuss. I am very pleased to announce the co-option of a new Councillor, Mrs Marie–Louise (M-L) Hays, to the council: she has been a resident in the village for several years and is a very welcome addition

to the council. It was very refreshing to meet in person the new Police Inspector Ricky Lee responsible for policing in our area. He outlined his vision and commitment to policing the area, highlighted current resource constraints and his strategy going forward, which was well received by the Councillors. We look forward to working with Ricky and his team in the future. Councillor Chris Williams gave a comprehensive report from a Wiltshire Council perspective, highlighting the approval of the budget. He focused on areas where spending has been increased and included: Whole life pathway (mental health, autism spectrum conditions and learning disabilities support services); Living and ageing well (adult care); Families and children; Environment (which includes waste and recycling services); Highways

and transport; and Education and skills. Finally Chris mentioned that Wiltshire Council is proposing a 2.99% general increase for the council's element of council tax, plus a 2% levy to be spent solely on adult social care.

Paul Hartley very kindly joined the meeting to give an in-person review one year on from the introduction of Speed Watch and to present the analysis of the data from the Speed Indicator Device (SIDs) electronic sign, which he has been positioning around the village. The SIDs data when compared to the official data recorded by the last official Metro Count is indicating that there has been a fall in the average speed of vehicles passing through the village, which is very encouraging, particularly as the general perception is that traffic is moving faster. Whilst we cannot confirm whether this is primarily due to the SIDs or the proactive work of the Speed Watch, what we can surmise from the data is that the investment made by the PC has delivered a tangible positive impact and improved road safety. One key constraint for the Speed Watch team is the number of willing volunteers (currently only nine people) prepared to undergo the training and operate the equipment in the village. The Speed Watch team is influencing behaviours and with more volunteers we would be able to increase the roadside presence and continue to help reduce the speed of the traffic through the village. If you feel you want to make a difference and contribute to the safety of the village, please contact Phil Gill and register for the Speed Watch training. I wish to personally thank Paul for his enthusiasm, dedication, and leadership in maintaining the Speed Watch team and congratulate all of the volunteers who are making a difference.

Potholes – there have been several issues raised regarding potholes in the village and in particular the condition of the A338 between the Collingbournes and the condition of Saxon Rise. A request has been made to the highway's maintenance team to see if the repair of this stretch of the A338 can be given a higher priority, due to the high volume of HGVs using it and the danger of vehicles swerving across the road to avoid the potholes. The PC understand that villagers have been following the Wiltshire Council process for registering potholes and have been disappointed by the response. The policy is that all potholes must be individually registered, and repairs are sanctioned on a priority basis set by the Wiltshire Council. Councillors agreed that the matter was to be raised at the next LHFIG meeting by Councillors Dennis and Knowlson and that Councillor Lyons will task the Parish Steward to see if he could repair any of the potholes.

Councillor Peter Knowlson reported the demolition of the shelter on the recreation ground was complete and the area made safe. He thanked the Councillors and members from the village who helped with removal and disposal. The next steps will be to agree to some seating to go in its place.

Councillor Stephen Lyons reported that the Parish Steward has been on secondment to highways filling in potholes and carrying out highways road maintenance. The good news is he is back in the village on 15th March to get things back to normal. The Village Spring Clean is to be held on Sunday 2nd April and will be run on similar lines to previous Litter Picks. The Clerk reported that the PC now has 'Title Absolute' of The Great Mere under HM Lang Registry Title WT256799 and that The Great Mere has been added to the PC's Asset Register.

Councillor David Dennis reported that the first meeting with T J Morris at Amesbury went well, they advised that they look into reducing some of the traffic that is routed through the villages. They also advised that they are currently well underway with a new distribution centre in Warrington, which will serve the Midlands area. This will reduce the northwards deliveries from Amesbury, as it is having to utilise the southern distribution centre now because Liverpool is at capacity. This will reduce some of the traffic through the village.

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Some dates for the diary:

Coronation Celebrations, Saturday 6th May 2023. Councillor Dennis, with the assistance of Councillors Lyons and Knowlson, reported that planning for the Coronation Celebration is well advanced. The plan is to celebrate the Coronation on the afternoon of the 6th May, at The Tipple Inn from 2pm till late, with an afternoon tea, sandwiches, cake (competition), face painting etc. In the evening entertainment will be a live band and some warm food, Curry & Chilli as well as a buffet. We hope you will all come and join the celebrations.

Christmas Big Brunch, Sunday 10th December 2023. Councillor Lyons reported that the Village Hall, burger van, face painting and balloon modelling have already been booked for 10th December. This is an annual event, and all are welcome.

Councillor Tom Earle reported on **No Mow May**. No Mow May is just around the corner and in the interest of the environment villagers are encouraged not to mow their lawns. There will be No Mow May signs in the Council-owned areas where we've agreed not to mow; these will be made from reclaimed wood in keeping with the aesthetic of the village.

Now that the weather is beginning to clear and warm up, we will be creating the 'bug hotels' in the village. Reclaimed wood signs will mark the locations to ensure that these habitats are not seen as random wood piles. This activity will start in April, and all villagers are welcome to support the activity which will be promoted on the PC website.

Our next Parish Council Meeting scheduled for Thursday 18th May 2023 at 7 pm is the AMP and AMPC and will take place in Collingbourne Ducis Village Hall. Parish Council Meetings are open events, which members of the public are more than welcome to attend. The March monthly meeting of the group took place on 9th March and was followed by the Annual Meeting.



The meeting began with a talk about emergency cover by the Scottish and Southern Electricity Network in the case of power cuts. The SSEN is the company responsible for bringing power from the grid to the electricity meter of buildings. From then on it is managed by various power companies such as OVO. Houses with children under five, people over sixty-five, or with disabilities, are advised to arrange to be on the list of consumers who may need special help in the case of a prolonged power cut. The number to ring to report a power cut is 105. They also advised having an 'emergency' bag packed and tucked away somewhere in the event of having to evacuate your house. They ended the talk by showing a power pack - a gadget which can be charged and will keep a mobile phone going – or even start an electric car. They had leaflets with all the useful information on them and they also demonstrated glow sticks. These will provide light for up to twelve hours and are much safer than candles. The representatives were thanked for an interesting and informative talk. Questions were asked and answered during a break for refreshments. There was no raffle this month.

The evening continued with a short business meeting which was followed by the AM. The annual reports were read by the Treasurer

and Secretary. In the absence of the outgoing President her report was read by Alison Comlay, a County Advisor, who was present to help with the elections. The committee was re-elected en-bloc but Wendy Brown and Karen Preece stood down from their roles as president and treasurer. These positions are now the responsibility of Marilyn Clifton and Chani Mindelsohn. The meeting thanked Wendy and Karen for their years of hard work.

The meeting was declared closed.

I do still use the local businesses, admittedly not in the way I did during the Pandemic, but probably as much as I did before the Pandemic.


Is it enough? I don't know?

POTATO DAUPHINOISE

Simon Gilford writes:

A perfect accompaniment to pretty much every dinner in my humble opinion. I had forgotten how quick and easy it is to make and how good it really is. We <u>really</u> like cheese so up to you if you want to reduce the quantity to make it just a little less calorific!

Ingredients (for 2 people):

450g potatoes (apparently Maris Piper are the best)

2 cloves of garlic

50g of cheese (cheddar is fine, and a larger quantity is also good!)

50g grated hard Italian style cheese (parmesan)

1 shallot

1 vegetable stock cube (optional)

150g crème fraiche

75 ml of water

Method

Bring a medium saucepan of water to the boil with 1/2 tsp of salt and preheat your oven to 220°C. Peel the potato and slice into 1cm thick rounds. Pop the potato into your pan of boiling water, cook until just tender, 10-12 mins. Once cooked, reserve some of the potato cooking water (see ingredients for amount), then carefully drain in a colander and set aside.

Meanwhile, halve, peel and thinly slice the shallot. Peel and finely chop the garlic (or use a garlic press). Grate the cheddar cheese. Heat a drizzle of oil in a frying pan on medium heat. Once hot, add the shallot and fry until softened, 4-5 mins. Stir in the garlic and cook for 1 minute, then pour in reserved potato cooking water and vegetable stock. Bring to the boil and simmer until reduced slightly, 1-2 mins. Stir in the creme fraiche, bring to the boil then remove from the heat.

Stir the cheddar and half the hard Italian cheese into the sauce, then taste and add salt and pepper if you feel it needs it. Layer half the potatoes into a small ovenproof dish, then pour on half the sauce. Layer in the remaining potatoes and pour in the remaining sauce. Sprinkle

ANOTHER DIP INTO THE PAST

Keith Cockerton writes:

This month's delve into the past looks at articles from the archives that highlight changes and similarities between now and the 1800s. As in current times, the first two show a strong sense of community and 'looking after our own'.

Devizes and Wiltshire Gazette

COLLINGBOURNE KINGSTON. Probate of the will, dated the 5th November 1889, the late Miss Elizabeth Piper, of Highfield Lodge, Collingbourne Kingston (now in Ducis), who died on the 3rd July last, 'leaving £11,193, has bequeathed to the Cottage Hospital £500; for such institution for the benefit of the deaf and dumb the executors may select, £500; for institutions for the blind. £500; to the vicar and churchwardens of Collingbourne Ducis, £200, expend the income thereof in coals and blankets for poor persons who have attained 55 years of age; and to the vicar and churchwardens of Collingbourne Kingston for similar objects, £1,000'.

Devizes and Wiltshire Gazette - Thursday 05 January 1860

Collingbourne Kingstone. 'The eleventh annual dinner given to the aged poor of this parish, took place on Friday last, at the Collingbourne Kingstone Inn, when about 40 recipients of both sexes (above 60 years of age) partook of an excellent dinner of roast beef and plum pudding. Mr C. H. Poore, Mrs. Poore, and the gentlemen of the village, assisted in carving and waiting on the aged party. After dinner each person was regaled with a pint of beer, or a glass of gin and water, together with tobacco and snuff. A more interesting scene could

not be witnessed. Those who from sickness or infirmity could not attend, received Is. 6d. each.'

As ever there have been accidents and mishaps and the 19th century was no different.

Warminster Herald - Saturday 15 August 1868

'Collingbourne Kingstone. GUN ACCIDENT. On the afternoon of Friday, two children named Martha Dickenson, aged about 15 years, and Honor Matthews, a younger girl, with others, were in the house of a man named Fisher, which adjoins the premises occupied by the parents of the former. During the afternoon the girl Dickenson went into her house, took a loaded gun, which had been left there by her grandfather, and following Honor, Matthews, pointed the weapon at her, which went off, the whole charge entering the poor girl's right thigh. She was at once taken to her own home, and Dr. Fitcher was sent for, who has carefully attended the sufferer, and we are glad to say that hopes are entertained of her recovery.'

Devizes and Wiltshire Gazette - Thursday 04 February 1864

'COLLINGBOURNE KINGSTONE. Inquest. An inquest was held on Thursday, before G. Sylvester, esq., the body of William Perry, a ploughboy, in the service of Mr. Thomas Sheppard, farmer. Deceased was returning from his master's coppice with three horses and waggon loaded with rushes Tuesday, when in going down a hill the horses started off into a trot. Deceased, who was walking at their side, was knocked down and both near wheels passed over his body. Mr. T. D. Baker, surgeon, who examined the body, stated that several ribs were crushed in upon the lungs, causing laceration of the same and death. —Verdict—Accidental Death.'

There was no shortage of crime in those days, most of which was fairly petty or traffic related (much as now but with different vehicles and life styles).

Devizes and Wiltshire Gazette - Thursday 11 October 1888

"Edward Wicks, engine driver, in the employ of Messrs. H. and W. Rawlings, of Collingbourne Ducis, was summoned by the police, for allowing a traction engine to stop and water at Enford Bridge on the 20th September, contrary to the by-laws of the Highway and Locomotive Amendment Act. P.C. Pearce of Enford stated the case, and defendant admitted the offence. The Bench told the defendant he was liable to a heavy fine, but it being the first case of the sort, which had been brought before them (the Everleigh Bench), they would let him off this time by paying fine of 10s. and the costs.'

Devizes and Wiltshire Gazette - Thursday 02 May 1867

'Mr. D. W. Clunes was summoned for removing three heifers and two cows a greater distance than 500 yards on turnpike, at Collingbourne Kingstone, without a license, on the 3rd of April, and was fined 9s. 6d. including costs.'

'John Pepall, a carter, in the employ of Messrs. Mortimore and Kellow, millers, of Andover, was summoned for riding in waggon with horses on the Devizes and Andover Turnpike, without reins or any person to guide the same, on the 26th March. Sergeant Luffman proved the case and stated that defendant rode all the way from Collingbourne Ducis to Ludgershall, a distance of two miles, there being another man who also rode with him. Defendant now said in his defence that the snow was so deep that he could not walk by the side of his horses, and so was compelled to ride; but this was denied, the road was quite clear of snow, the last fall of snow having taken place on the 19th March, which was followed by a rapid thaw. He was convicted, and fined 19s. 6d. including costs.'

Devizes and Wiltshire Gazette - Thursday 05 January 1860

'December 30th, 1859. James Crouch, was charged with having stolen 25lbs. of coal, the property of Martha Buckeridge, Collingbourne Kingston, on the

26th inst. The prosecutrix, who keeps the Cleaver Inn, at Collingbourne, had sent the prisoner to Burbage wharf for a load of coal, and the policeman, James Mould, happening to come the road after he had returned, saw a lump of coal near it, and on making enquiries found it was left there by the prisoner, who had sent a message to his brother to fetch it. He apprehended the prisoner the following day, when he said, "I will tell the truth, my brother Tom ordered to bring 1 cwt. of coal from Devizes Thursday, and didn't do so, and my brother didn't know but that this was it." This was proved in evidence, and Mr. T. W. Brooke, of Burbage, proved the prisoner had not bought any coal except Miss Buckeridge's 33 cwt. Prisoner, who was servant to Mr. Sheppard, pleaded guilty, and having received a good character from his master, was sentenced to one month's imprisonment.'

James Walker, was fined 3s. 6d. for being drunk and disorderly at Collingbourne, on Saturday the 3rd last.

'False Balances. —Miss Anne Wheeler, of Collingbourne, was summoned by Superintendent Stretton, the inspector of weights and measures, with having beam and scales in her possession six ounces against the customer. J. Mould proved that they had been used for weighing flour for a long time. Miss Wheeler said the scales were never used for weighing at all, and she was not aware of their inequality. The bench, addressing Miss Wheeler, said it was a very aggravated case, as in using the scales for selling small lots of flour, she had every time cheated the poor persons who had dealt with her out of a large quantity; it was a most disgraceful case and she would be fined £4 and cost, 11s, and forfeit the beams and scales. The money was immediately paid, and the Bench ordered the scales to be burnt.'

Devizes and Wiltshire Gazette - Thursday 03 November 1864

'Robert Blackmore, labourer, was charged by Mr. J. Hill, farmer, Collingbourne Ducis, with damaging grass the amount of a penny, by walking thereon, on the inst. Ordered to pay damage and costs. —Richard Crouch of

Collingbourne Kingstone, was charged with cruelly beating and ill-treating a donkey, the property of James White, labourer, Collingbourne Ducis.'

Salisbury and Winchester Journal - Saturday 29 December 1855

'The inhabitants of Collingbourne Kingston and Ducis were about a quarter to five on the morning of Thursday alarmed by the cry of fire, which was discovered to proceed from the bakehouse of Mr. Saunders, speedily igniting his dwelling-house and shop, and from thence to the King's Arms Inn, conducted by Mr. Samuel Sheppard, which also soon fell prey to the flames. The flakes of fire drifted by the wind then caught the out-houses and dwelling-houses of two deserving and industrious mechanics, Charles Mead and Jeremiah Morse, scarcely allowing them time to remove themselves and furniture before they were burnt to the ground. It was fortunate the wind was blowing from the south-east, or the flames must have extended to the farm buildings occupied by Mrs. Grace, and thus endangered the greater part of Collingbourne Ducis. Mr. Saunders and Mr. Sheppard were insured. No life was lost, with the exception of that of a noble Newfoundland dog, belonging to Mr. Saunders, who, although liberated from his chain, rushed back to his usual abiding place, and thus fell a sacrifice."

Rural life would not be the same without the mundane but good intentioned event.

Devizes and Wiltshire Gazette - Thursday 04 April 1889

'A presentation was made at the Manor House, Everleigh, on March 26th. The servants, tradespeople, and Others connected with the Manor House, presented Mr. and Mrs. C. Curtis with a handsome and massive punch bowl, inscribed with their crest. The gift was accompanied by an illuminated address, with Mr. and Mrs. Curtis's monograms, and containing over 120 signatures. It was worded as follows "Sir and Madam, We, the undersigned servants, tradespeople, and others connected with the Everleigh estate, beg your


acceptance of this punch bowl, as a small token our respect and gratitude for the many acts of kindness received from you from all the residence in Everleigh. That you may both live many happy years to use it, is the wish of the undersigned." The presentation, which was pleasant surprise to Mr. and Mrs. Curtis, was witnessed by nearly all the villagers, whose ages ranged from two years to 82. The Everleigh band conducted by Mr. E. Jenkins, was in attendance, and played selection of music. The proceedings concluded with hearty cheers for Mr. and Mrs. Curtis and their family.'

Most of the sources for this article no longer exist other than in newspaper archives. There is still a desire for local news - what is on, events and general information - today. Whilst we still have local newspapers, we are more likely to find this information now in the Courier, celebrating its 30th year of publication, the local pages on Facebook and the Parish Council's website.
