Dear Parishioners, as Spring approaches, the Parish Council are planning a refurbishment of the village playground. We are conscious that the surface, due to time, weather and moss infestation is very slippery and have put up signage to warn users of this risk. One of the things that

we would like to do therefore is to renew the surface with the modern equivalent of the existing surface. We are hopeful that recent pruning of the trees at the Rec and removal of the diseased Ash trees, will bring more airflow and light into the equation and prevent a new surface suffering as the old one did. We are also conscious that the existing play equipment caters for children in the age range of

two to ten years. There is nothing apart from the goals and basketball hoop for children in the age range of ten to sixteen years. So what would your children like to see installed; a zip line, a sunken trampoline or something else? Obviously, the Parish Council will be working to a budget for this refurbishment and is in the process of bidding for funding to provide some of it. I am also pleased to report that the bridge across the Bourne on footpath CKIN1 has been refurbished prior to Christmas by Wiltshire Council. REDUCE, REUSE, RECYCLE

Chris Williams, Wiltshire Councillor for Ludgershall North and Rural, writes: The Council's current household waste management strategy follows the waste hierarchy, aiming to reduce, reuse and recycle as much as possible, while dealing with residual waste in the most sustainable way. The Council has two landfill diversion contracts in place to help manage its residual waste and very little Wiltshire household residual waste is sent to landfill, and any food waste present is used to contribute to the generation of energy or processing into a fuel.

You may have seen in other local authorities and indeed overseas, weekly or twice weekly doorstep food waste collections. Wiltshire Council's current waste strategy is to not provide a separate collection of food waste as the provision of such a system would be prohibitively expensive to implement and operate across the large rural county. The current plan prioritises working with residents to reduce the amount of food wasted in the first instance, helping families to not waste money, and by continuing to offer subsidised home food waste digester's. Wiltshire Council has teamed up with Great Green Systems to offer Wiltshire residents discounted food waste composters, called a Green Johanna. These 'hot composters' are available for only £60 (discounted from £129.99). More information is online at Reducing your waste and composting - Wiltshire Council

Alongside this, the Government has consulted widely on proposed policy which would mandate consistency in household and business recycling collections in England. This is expected to include the mandatory introduction of weekly food waste collections by 2025.

All the council's kerbside collected recyclables are managed by Hills at a materials recycling facility at Sands Farm, Calne. The Council

benefits from a 79% share of the income generated from the sale of materials collected through the kerbside recycling service. During the six months April to September 2022, this realised £2.24m in income, as recycling commodity prices were particularly strong during the first part of the year. However, increasing levels of contamination can result in downgraded prices paid, or material being rejected. Residents can help improve recycling rates, and ultimately reduce the cost of managing waste to the Council taxpayer by ensuring that:

Only recyclables are put into blue bins – sadly all too often bags of general waste and nappies find their way into the blue bins.

Flexible or soft plastics, such as bread bags, packaging film and carrier bags cannot be recycled through the blue-bin scheme – people should place these in their residual waste bins where the waste is used to generate energy, or alternatively take to a local supermarket if they have facilities to collect them for recycling.

Packing materials in cardboard boxes (such as polystyrene). This can't be recycled so we recommend that non-card packing materials are put into the residual waste.

Wrapping paper - only paper wrapping paper can be recycled. To check if wrapping paper is made of paper, people can use the 'scrunch test'. Scrunch the paper and if it stays in a ball, it can be recycled in your blue-lidded bin.

Scrap metals – large biscuit tins can be recycled, but large car parts cannot!

Wiltshire Council has recently introduced a kerbside battery collection service. People can now leave most small household

batteries for recycling (as long as they are not leaking) including D, C, AA, AAA, 9V and button-type batteries and these should be placed on top of blue-lidded bins in a sealed, transparent plastic bag ready for collection. Every year hundreds of fires at waste facilities across the country are linked to batteries thrown out in the bin. People can help to prevent fires and keep staff safe by only disposing of batteries using the new kerbside collection service or at battery collection points at locations such as supermarkets.

Finally, I would like to thank residents across the Tidworth, Ludgershall and our Rural Parishes for everything you do to reduce the impact on the environment and the cost of managing waste to Council Taxpayers. More detailed information is online at Rubbish and recycling - Wiltshire Council

MAY 6TH, 2023 - KING CHARLES' CORONATION, DUCIS VILLAGE HALL David Paterson writes:

This week the Village Hall is starting a major project providing additional storage space adjoining the main hall. We aim to clear the hall of the multitude of equipment, yet still have all of this readily available adjacent to the main hall and at the same time, free up space to review overall usage of the building. This of course will not happen overnight. We have already removed trees where the extension will be built and full planning permission has been granted for a new porch area and the storage extension. This week the footings and base for the extension will be started.

A major part of these developments is of course fundraising. We have accrued a significant sum in our reserves to begin this work. Much more is still needed. An application has been made to the Platinum Jubilee Fund, we have passed the first hurdle and are now completing Stage Two of the process. Other sources of funding will be sought including local fundraising events. We hope that you will join us in these to ensure the success of this project.

Maintenance of the Village Hall requires a great deal of effort and support. We are extremely grateful to the volunteer committee members who give freely of their time to undertake many of these. Without this the maintenance and repair bills for the hall would be much greater. Our maintenance budget increases each year. We also have the tennis court, (owned by the Village Hall), to keep up and in good condition. The cost of energy has hit us all, our energy costs have increased by thousands of pounds. A regular contribution to our funds is provided by the monthly Draw. This has been running since 1976 and has contributed thousands of pounds of income. Monthly prizes are given. This is administered now by Humphrey Sheppard. He would welcome new contributors.

Those of us old enough will remember June 2nd, 1953, the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth 2nd. It is one of my first memories; the first time I watched television, the children's party in the Laverton Institute, the outdoor celebration on the cricket field and the Coronation mugs given to all the children in the town. (I still have mine). It is important, particularly so at this difficult time, to join together to celebrate the Coronation. Events will be planned and if you have any thoughts on these, please let us know, we hope to make this a truly memorable weekend.



GARDENING TIPS FOR MARCH

Floribunda writes:

General:

Spring clean the garden

Weed and mulch borders - divide perennials

Remove moss and weeds on paths and steps

Trees, shrubs and climbers:

Prune bush roses and buddleia

Cut back dogwoods – coppice eucalyptus

Last chance to plant bare root plants

Flowers and vegetables:

Divide snowdrops 'in the green'

Plant gladioli and lily bulbs

Prepare the vegetable plot

Sow lettuce, radishes, leeks, spring onions, broad beans, spinach, to name a few

Plant out onion sets, shallots and garlic

Under cover:

Clean the greenhouse

Water plants sparingly

Sow hardy annuals eg. sweet peas

Sow tomatoes, chillies, sweet peppers and aubergines in a heated propagator

Start dormant dahlias, begonias, arum lilies, canna by potting up and keep frost free

Plant a few potato tubers in large pots for an early crop.

Lawns:

Clear winter debris

Redefine lawn edges

Cut on a high setting if dry enough



KEEP YOUR CHIMNEYS FIRE-SAFE THIS WINTER

Louise Knox, Senior Communications Officer, Dorset & Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service, writes:

DORSET & WILTSHIRE FIRE AND RESCUE

Dorset & Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service is urging local people to take care with open fires in the home after a number of chimney fires over the weekend.

Open fires are a warm, welcoming addition to the home, but they do carry risks. If you have an open fire, you should:

Always use a fire guard to protect against flying sparks from hot embers;

Make sure that embers are properly put out before you leave the property or go to bed; and

Keep chimneys and flues clean and well maintained.

Group Manager Graham Kewley said: 'A combination of colder weather and trying to keep costs down means people are more likely to be lighting fires or using wood-burning stoves.

Chimneys should be swept twice a year as a minimum to remove accumulated soot and tar, as well as making sure that the chimney is clear of debris. Green, or unseasoned wood, shouldn't be used as it smoulders with long burning embers and produces a lot of creosote and not much heat.

Build-ups of creosote in a chimney or flue can become highly flammable and dangerous. You should also avoid burning painted, coated or treated wood, as this can release harmful gases.'

Another danger is the storage of wood and other fuel immediately next to a wood-burning stove, as heat can build up and lead to a fire igniting.

Blocked or defective chimney flues also carry the risk of leading to carbon monoxide poisoning so, as well as getting chimneys swept, people are encouraged to fit smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors in their homes.

SAVERNAKE TEAM LETTER: "I DO DESPAIR!"

Rev Michael McHugh, Savernake Team Rector, writes:

On the wall of my office there is a poster that I've mentioned before. It has Jesus holding his hand against his head saying: 'Let me get this straight, you say you take the bible literally enough to reject almost all the scientists say, BUT YOU DON'T TAKE IT LITERALLY ENOUGH TO FEED THE POOR!'

The church has just released its document on sexual matters, 'Living in Love and Faith.' In some circles it has caused an uproar. Complainants use one sentence in Leviticus 18:22 to justify a dubious theological position that implies that the Creator made a mistake creating different sexualities. Culturally sexual rulings in Judaism come from the need to preserve the tribe. In this, women are traded goods that become the property of the family. Failing to fertilise the woman and provide offspring was an abomination. Our world is very different, and one could argue that profligate childbearing is the modern abomination.

All of this is so distant to Jesus who has very little to say on sexual matters other than 'sin no more' and 'let the one without sin cast the first stone.' In a culture where the woman has been at fault since Genesis, Jesus gets the men to judge themselves.

We are approaching that great and dreadful mystery that is the Cross and Resurrection of Jesus. The danger is that we root ourselves in those parts of the bible that suit our purposes instead of understanding what it is all about.

For myself, I have moved from a lexicological understanding that provided comfort and security to a position which is uneasy and ill defined, but I believe closer to the Lord. The road to the cross is not comfortable or reassuring!

We have a world suffering from phenomenal insecurity and in it we are surrounded by vulnerability. Let's leave God to do the judging and remove the stress of judging from ourselves. Let's try to follow what Jesus actually told us to do, 'Love your Neighbour and Love God.'

In our 'Give Up Stress for Lent' enjoy the many things we have on offer. Have a peaceful and reflective season,




