THE VIEW FROM EVERLEIGH

A village work party took place on Saturday 15th April to conduct general maintenance and tidying up at the



playground. Many thanks go to the seven volunteers who cleaned and painted all the equipment, and strimmed the perimeter fence. This play area is now looking very smart!

As previously informed, our village celebration of the King's Coronation takes place on Saturday 6th May at the playground/Jubilee Field, starting at 5 pm. The event will include a BBQ and games/activities such as egg + spoon races, relay races, rounders, volleyball, badminton, and golf pitch + putt. Festivities will culminate with the lighting of a bonfire beacon at 8.30 pm. We will be setting up from 10 am on Friday 5th May and applying finishing touches from 9.30 am on the day; all volunteers are welcome.

On Sunday morning, 16th July, we intend to walk the parish boundary to commemorate the ancient ceremony of Beating the Bounds of Everleigh Parish. The plan is to assemble at 9 am at the V Tank Crossing/Weatherhill Firs situated 1km south of The Crown on the Netheravon Rd, and then conduct a leisurely 8 mile+ hike around most of our scenic parish boundary, to finish at about 1 pm. Further details will follow.

LOCAL LADS SAVE DAY - CHARLES WILL BE KING

David Puttock:

Surnames, like all words, are interesting. Debbie Bainton, who won our readership survey book token, shares a variation of her surname with a 15th C monk – whose name we do not know!

In Edington Priory Church sits the altar tomb, c 1485* and considered to

be of national importance, of an unnamed monk. But the tomb bears a carved rebus (a representation of a name by pictures representing the component parts of the name), repeated in eight places, of a sprig emerging from a barrel. This is



interpreted as 'bay' (as in laurel tree), 'in' 'tun' (large barrel), giving the name Baynton or Bainton.

Which is reasonable as it is known that there were Bayntons living in the area at the time and the hamlet of Baynton is a stone's throw NE of Edington. Baynton House is a quarter of a mile away in Coulston and Baynton Down is one and a half miles to the south.

The Bainton surname is a habitational name, signifying that the family originated in a place called Baynton/Bainton or nearby. This is an Old English (OE – the language spoken by the Anglo-Saxons) place-name deriving from the personal forename *Bæga* coupled with *ton*, a

homestead or settlement = the settlement of Bæga (Oxford Dictionary of English Place-names 1955). The α in Bæga is the OE letter Ash and is pronounced like the α in cat.

And if you are wondering, as I am confident you all are, how the *g* sound in Bæga vanished, it was never there as the *g* sound (as in bag) we would assume it to be. In OE it would have been pronounced either as y, according to one rule, or as the abominable velar fricative according to another. The velar fricative does not exist in modern English as a phoneme (a distinct speech sound in a language) so it is difficult for us to pronounce. You have to use the back of the throat to achieve a sort of vowel with a soft growl sound. Either way, over time, in spoken usage of the place-name the sound would have disappeared into the vowels around it. It cost me a long evening and a headache to work that stuff out. The thing is, we don't know how some OE words were pronounced because no-one can recall hearing an Anglo-Saxon say them. A look at how the current name of Bainton (from the *ton* of *Baga*) in Yorkshire developed is helpful.

1086 (Domesday Book) = Bagentone

1185 = Baington (the n and the g may have been accidentally transposed by the scribe, or this may have something to do with French/Norman influence. Or, if the scribe heard the name spoken by someone with a bad cold; that's all it would have taken)

1191 = Baenton

1222 = Bainton

2023 = Bainton

Something that stands out here is that there are four different recorded spellings in a period of a hundred and thirty-six years, and then the same spelling stuck for eight hundred years. The main reasons for this aren't difficult to work out if you ponder it.

Considering the Baynton place-names in the area, and the number and prominence of the people taking the name (the Bayntons of Faulston Manor, and many other manors, were one of the richest families in the county), Baynton village must at one time have been of some significance. Not anymore.

By 1858 Baynton was a 'tything** in the parish of Edington, hundred of Whorweldown ... containing 33 inhabitants' (A Topographical Survey of England, Samuel Lewis). Now there is hardly anything left of Baynton. A decrepit road sign points in the direction of just three or four houses and a farm.

Finally, in Edington we see a rare example of a long established village name reverting to an earlier spelling. This can only happen now by a deliberate decision being made to do this, not by shifts in pronunciation or any of the old reasons. In the late 1980s a movement to re-establish the oldest recorded version of the name, which was OE *Epandune* (or Ethandune; that þ is the OE letter Thorn), started to make some headway.

One reason behind this movement was that the name had been corrupted over the centuries to end up looking as if it had originally meant 'the ton (OE settlement, as in Baynton) of Etha's people'. This obscured the historical significance of the original 'dun' ending which is a pre-Anglo-Saxon word, from the British language of the Celts, meaning 'hill'. It is where our word for the downs (which are also ups) comes from. Ethandune probably meant barren hill, which would still fit today.

The other reason for going back to Ethandun (I don't know why they dropped the *e*) is that the name was recorded in the Anglo-Saxon Chronicle annal for 878 as the site of a battle that turned out to be of world historical importance. With 'all the men of Somerset and Wiltshire and that part of Hampshire which was on this side of the sea

(the Solent)' Alfred went 'to Ethandune; and there he fought against the entire host, and put it to flight'.

This was the last chance for Alfred. He had just emerged from his refuge at Athelney having previously been roundly defeated by the Danes. If he had lost at Ethandune it is unlikely his people would have thought it was worth continuing the fight. The creation of modern England, and the ensurance of its survival, was achieved by Alfred crushing at Ethandune the Danish (Viking) Great Heathen Army ('the entire host') led by King Guthrum of East Anglia.

The village sign now reads both Ethandun and Edington and bears the date of the battle.

So, no victory for the men of Wiltshire at Ethandune, no King Charles.

And there is every chance that distant ancestors of Mark, Debbie's husband, fought in that battle.

It is 23 miles from the Collingbournes to Ethandun.



From a sketch of the original Bratton white horse which was obliterated in the 18th C by the horse we see today. It may, or may not, have been cut after the Battle of Ethandun. It faces to the right.

*Not long after 1471 when the Baynton family, lords of Faulston (at Bishopstone) lost all their properties after Robert Baynton fought on the losing, Lancastrian, side at the Battle of Tewkesbury.

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
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BURBAGE & DISTRICT MODEL RAILWAY CLUB (BDMRC)

CRISPY CHICKEN, GARLIC BUTTER SAUCE AND CHEESY MASH

Simon Gilford writes:

So, this is a kind of deconstructed Chicken Kyiv, and a lot easier in my humble opinion as you don't have to faff about with all that stuffing malarkey! I really love garlic, so I ever so slightly overdid the amount in my first attempt at this recipe. Baking the garlic gives a far more palatable result, so I'll leave you to decide on quantities. And I'd never even thought of cooking French beans in this way – it is a game changer. I also used chicken breast but think that thighs will be tastier the next time I cook this one.

Whilst it looks like there are a lot of steps to this recipe, do the preparation of the ingredients and then it really is easy. It is delicious too and you can thank me later!

INGREDIENTS (FOR 2 PEOPLE):

2 skinless chicken breasts (or 4 boneless thighs)

450g potatoes

3 (or more!) cloves of garlic

30-50g of cheddar cheese

1 shallot

50g panko breadcrumbs

80g French beans

1 small bunch of flat-leaf parsley

1 small chicken stock cube (or 10g chicken paste)

15ml cider vinegar

1 egg

40g salted butter (for the sauce)

100ml of water (for the sauce)

PREPARATION:

Bring a medium saucepan of water to the boil with 1/2 tsp of salt and preheat your oven to 220°C. Peel the potatoes and chop them into 2cm chunks. Meanwhile, sandwich each chicken breast between two pieces of baking paper. Pop onto a board, then give it a bash with the bottom of a saucepan until it's 1-2 cm thick. Season with salt and pepper.

Crack the egg into a medium-sized bowl and whisk. Put the panko breadcrumbs into another bowl, and season with salt and pepper. Dip the chicken into the egg and then the breadcrumbs, ensuring it's completely coated. Transfer to a clean plate and set aside for now.

Trim the French beans, then spread them out on a large baking tray. Drizzle with oil, season with salt and pepper, and then set aside.

Pop the garlic (unpeeled) into a small piece of foil with a drizzle of oil and scrunch to enclose it. Place it on the tray with the beans.

METHOD:

When your pan of water is boiling, add the potatoes and cook until you can easily slip a knife through, 15-20 mins. Meanwhile, pop a large frying pan on high heat and add enough oil to coat the bottom of the pan. You want the oil to be hot, so heat for 2-3 mins before you add the chicken.

Once hot, carefully lay the chicken into the pan, and fry until golden brown, 2-3 mins on each side. Then transfer the chicken to the baking tray and bake on the middle shelf of the oven until the chicken is cooked through and the beans are tender, 8-10 mins.

While everything cooks, halve, peel, and chop the shallot into small pieces. Roughly chop the parsley (stalks and all). Discard the oil from the (now empty) frying pan and pop back on medium heat with a drizzle of oil. Once hot, add the shallot and cook until softened, 4-5 mins.

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Once the potatoes are cooked, drain in a colander, and return to the pan, off the heat. Add a knob of butter and a splash of milk or cream (optional), then add the cheese and mash until smooth. Season with salt and pepper. Cover with a lid to keep warm.

Add the cider vinegar to the shallot pan and allow it to evaporate, then add the water for the sauce and chicken stock cube/paste. Bring to the boil, then lower the heat and simmer for 2-3 mins. Stir through the butter until melted, 1 min.

Once the garlic has roasted and cooled, cut the end with scissors, squeeze it out of the skin and mash with a fork. Stir the garlic and parsley through the butter sauce.

SERVING:

When everything's ready, share the cheesy mash between your plates and top with the crispy chicken. Serve the green beans alongside.

Spoon over your roasted garlic butter sauce to finish. Serve and enjoy!

Churchwarden Tish Leigh (01264 850867) writes: It was lovely to see so many people in church for our Easter Sunday Celebrations on 9th April. After a lovely service, the children had great fun hunting for the 180 little Easter eggs hidden all over the church.



The APCM was held on Monday 17th April when members of the PCC, the churchwarden, the secretary, and the treasurer were elected. Please see the church notice board for details.

The services in May include the traditional open-air service on Ascension Day, which is on Thursday 18th May this year. This date is forty days after the resurrection. The service is being held at Wilton Windmill at 7.30 pm. If you would like to come to this wonderful service but need a lift, please contact me. Ten days later (28th May) is Whit Sunday or Pentecost. This is the festival when Christians celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit. It is celebrated on the Sunday fifty days after Easter. Pentecost is regarded as the birthday of the Christian Church and the start of the Church's mission to the world.

I am delighted to report that, thanks to a very generous donation, the PCC now has enough funds to pay for the clock face of the turret clock to be repainted and regilded at the same time as the clock is being repaired. Hopefully, this work will begin in June.

Repairs to the clapper assemblies of the church bells and some other maintenance and conservation work has also become quite urgent if the bells are to continue to be rung. It is interesting to note that two of the six church bells are historic, one dating from pre-1499 and the other from 1608. The only time the bells have not been regularly rung in 700 years was during World War II. The PCC feel it is important that bells are repaired and conserved so that we can continue to enjoy hearing

them rung, as well as conserving them for future generations. The cost of the repairs will be £4,030 + VAT. We are hoping that the repair work will be able to take place in the Autumn. Some of the cost will be covered by grants but once again the PCC is appealing for donations and for your support at our fund-raising events.

The first of these events will be the popular Starters and Pudding Fest, which is back after a few years' break. This will be held at Collingbourne Ducis village hall on Friday 9th June starting at 6 pm. Bring a starter and/or a pudding to share and taste everyone else's! As anyone who has come to this evening in previous years will tell you, this is a culinary feast of an evening. Tickets £6 per adult and £3 per child under eleven. There will also be a bar and a raffle. Profits will go to help fund the repair and conservation work on the church bells.

We are also looking forward to the annual church fête on Saturday 2nd September. You will have seen the enclosed flyer announcing this event and asking for your thoughts about last year's fête and any ideas to make it even better.

Our next meeting for the fête planning committee meeting is on Tuesday 6th June at 7.30 pm in St. Andrew's Church. Please come along if you would like to be involved. We really do need your help and support if the fête is to be a success. Many hands will make it lighter work and even more fun!
